First Market June 20

The first Farmers' Market of the season will be Saturday, June 20 at the County Fairgrounds. Garden Up and Growing!

As of this writing, most of the garden has been planted and it is looking very good. The transplanted crops such as onions, broccoli and sunflowers are looking great. Many thanks to all who have come out to help. We also transplanted the peppers and tomatoes into the greenhouse on May 13 and they are doing quite well and just this week we staked the tomato plants. Finally, the raised beds are now all planted with either seed or transplants. We have six beds, one each for garlic, radishes, salad turnips, pak choi, lettuce and swiss chard and baby carrots.

The next and ever-present task will be weeding to keep the quack grass, thistle, mallow, and red root pigweed under control, plus some dandelions. They too are all growing very well. Harvesting will follow later on. Stay tuned to your e-mail for the dates and times of work sessions in the garden.
